

1945: Established by SECNAV James Forrestal, the Station was used for development and testing of allied and enemy mines. Capitalizing on the existing amphibious base, the Station was established with the following mission: "To perform research, development test and evaluation in mine defense, acoustic and torpedo countermeasures, inshore undersea warfare, swimmer-diver equipment and techniques and in related fields of science and engineering."







Background

- The Naval Surface Warfare Center Panama City Division (NSWC PCD) has led the development of the NavalX Gulf Coast Tech Bridge
- Tech Bridge will span from Tallahassee, FL to New Orleans, LA
- Tech Bridge will be a partnership between NSWC PCD, the Naval Research Lab (NRL) Ocean Sciences Division and the Naval Meteorology and Oceanography Command (CNMOC)
- Gulf Coast Tech Bridge launched December 2020


- Tech Bridge is currently documenting key ecosystem stakeholders, including government, industry & academia

NSWC PCD is partnering with CNMOC and NRL South for a NavalX Tech Bridge along the Gulf Coast.






Tech Bridge Differentiators



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Florida Programs to Mitigate Encroachment on Military Installations

January 21, 2021















Encroachment

What is "Encroachment"

 "External, as well as internal, DOD factors and influences that constrain or have the potential to inhibit the full access or operational use of the live training and test domain."

Types of Encroachment

- Urban development
- Threatened or endangered species
- Critical habitat
- Historic or cultural sites
- Noise
- Climate Change
- Radio Frequency competition
- Light Pollution

Impact of Encroachment on Military Missions

- Reduces usage days
- Prohibits certain operational, training and testing events
- Reduces range access
- Segments training and reduces realism
- Limits new technologies
- Restricts flight altitudes
- Inhibits new tactics development
- Reduces live fire proficiency
- Complicates night and all-weather operations and training
- Increases personnel tempo
- Increases costs or risks

Florida's Response

Florida Statute 288.980 (1) (c)

"The Legislature finds that encroachment of military installations has been identified by local, state, and federal leaders as a critical threat to protecting, preserving, and enhancing military installations in this state. Encroachment can be detrimental to the current and future missions of military installations due to the incompatible use of adjacent land."

Focuses of Florida Laws to Mitigate Encroachment

- Land Use Planning: Local governments required to include in comprehensive plans criteria to be considered to ensure that land use adjacent to a military base is compatible with the military mission.
- <u>Notification of Military</u>: Procedural requirements in place to provide planning and zoning information to the military and allow the military to comment on how the proposed development or planning change affects their mission.
- <u>Land Conservation</u>: State resources provided for open space protection to protect land from incompatible development.

Mechanisms to Handle Encroachment Issues

If local government comprehensive plan does not contain criteria addressing compatibility: DEO may notify the Administration Commission which may impose sanctions IAW F.S. 163.3184(8)

If a person considers their interests are adversely affected by a land development regulation: They may file a petition with DEO challenging the regulation on the grounds that it is not consistent with the local government comprehensive plan.

- Any ordinance that regulates development
- A general zoning code
- A zoning map
- Zoning or rezoning of land
- Any building construction standard

Military Representation on Local Planning or Zoning Board

F.S. 163.3175 (7):

To facilitate the exchange of information, a representative from the military, acting on behalf of all military installations within that jurisdiction, shall be included as an ex officio, nonvoting member of the county's or affected local government's land planning or zoning board.

State Land Protection Programs

Florida Forever:

An environmental land acquisition mechanism with a wide range of goals including environmental restoration, water resource development and supply, increased public access, public lands management and maintenance, and increased protection of land by acquisition of conservation easements.

Rural and Family Lands Protection Program:

Created to acquire perpetual agricultural conservation easements that protect valuable agricultural lands by creating easement documents that help to ensure sustainable agricultural practices and protect natural resources, not as the primary purpose, but in conjunction with the economically viable agricultural operations

Military Base Protection Program:

Obtains restrictive easements or fee simple land purchases of real estate that is not eligible for Florida Forever funds and serves to buffer bases

Governor's Base Commanders Meetings:

Provides a forum for base commanders to bring their concerns directly to the Governor

Federal Programs to Assist States with Encroachment Mitigation

Readiness and Environmental Protection Initiative (REPI):

Created to protect the military's ability to accomplish its training, testing, and operational missions by helping remove or avoid land-use conflicts near installations. REPI provides partial funding for the acquisition of land/development rights to buffer military installations but the state must provide matching funds.

Sentinel Landscapes:

A joint Dept. of Agriculture/Dept. of Defense/Dept. of the Interior program to preserve the working and rural character of key landscapes, strengthen the economies of farms, ranches, and forests; conserve habitats and natural resources; and protect vital test and training missions conducted on those military installations that anchor such landscapes.

Compatible Use Plan (CUP):

A cooperative land use planning effort between an affected local government and the military installation to ensure that development near a military installation is compatible with the base's mission, while at the same time ensuring the public health, safety, and quality of life of the community.

Federal Programs to Assist States with Encroachment Mitigation

Air Installations Compatibility Use Zones (AICUZ) Program:

Seeks to develop a cooperative relationship between military installations and the surrounding communities by providing land use compatibility guidelines that protect public health and safety and maintain military readiness. Focus is on noise, vertical obstructions, and accident potential zones.

U.S. Navy Range Air Installation Compatible Use Zone (RAICUZ):

US Navy program patterned after the DoD AICUZ program and extending the same process to Ranges

Enhanced Use Leasing (EUL) Program:

Provides authority to the military departments to lease non-excess real property, subject to several provisions, in exchange for cash or in-kind consideration and leverages the value of underutilized and underperforming assets.

Recent Events

- Gulf of Mexico Test and Training Range protected from oil drilling by Executive Order until June 30, 2032
- MBPP funds reverted to budget in 2020
- Two local governments made zoning decisions unfavorable to bases
- NW Florida region working on Sentinel Landscape proposal








A state crisis.





Formed by Baker, Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns Counties in November 2019 pursuant to Section 163.01, *Florida Statutes*, to coordinate efforts to end veteran suicides in NE Florida.

Appointed 5 Council Members and 5 Commission-Liaisons in December and an Executive Director in January.

The Challenge

6,435 U.S. veterans died by suicide in 2018. 577 of those were in Florida. The veteran suicide rate has risen 6% since 2005. Yet suicide is often preventable.

Our Vision

End veteran suicide in Northeast Florida.

Our Mission

Build an upstream, on-line *and* in-person, early intervention network of 10,000+ Gatekeeper veterans and civilian volunteers trained to identify risk factors of veterans in crisis and to direct those veterans to the community resources they require.

Identify and close gaps in those community resources available to our veterans.



The Watch Stander Program

- A network of community volunteers designed to connect veterans to the resources they need *before* they slip into crisis
- Volunteers take 45 min of online educational programming on how to identify warning signs, direct veterans to resources



SAMHSA Crisis Intercept Mapping



The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) has developed the Crisis Intercept Mapping process for Military and Veteran Suicide Prevention.



The Fire Watch is convening community stakeholders to map NE Florida.

Includes first responders, health care providers, mental health providers, military representatives.



The output from this workshop will inform future programming and help us determine where FY21 Microgrants are needed to improve support resources for veterans in Northeast Florida.



HE FIRE WATCH

Funding is the largest challenge in 2021

- State budget under pressure due COVID
- Federal grants not expected until 2022
- County funds (\$140k) and K94W in-kind contributions (\$147k) allow for maintenance and continuation of 2020 programs
- Education Programming, Training Module Enhancement, VRG Enhancements, Micro Grants, Targeted Outreach and Prevention Programs, and Program Staff additions are only possible via grants
- Grant request of FDSTF is \$250k

Florida's Sunshine, Public Records, and Ethics Laws

Florida Defense Support Task Force

288.987 Florida Defense Support Task Force

(2) The mission of the Task Force is to make recommendations to preserve and protect military installations to support the state's position in research and development related to or arising out of military missions and contracting, and to improve the state's military-friendly environment for service members, military dependents, military retirees, and businesses that bring military and base-related jobs to the state.

Task Force

- ...required by section 288.987(7) to contract with the Department of Economic Opportunity, which subjects it to multiple requirements.
- ...has also contracted with EFI to provide ongoing administrative support.
- ...is a public agency subject to Florida's public records and sunshine laws and members of board of directors are subject to Florida's Code of Ethics.

Task Force

- Task Force (by letter) has assigned authority to EFI to...
 - take administrative and operational action in name of Task Force, and...
 - serve as Task Force's representative in direct interactions with the State, and...
 - make staffing and administrative decisions to support Task Force, and...
 - enter into and execute contracts on behalf of Task Force as its legal designee.

Public Records

Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.

- Definition of "public record" is very broad.
- Section 119.011(12), Fla. Stat.
 - all documents, papers, letters, maps, books, tapes, photographs, films, sound recordings, data processing software, or other material...
 - ...<u>regardless of the physical form, characteristics, or means of transmission</u>
 - ...made or received pursuant to law or ordinance <u>or in</u> <u>connection with the transaction of official business</u> by any agency.
 - Includes a private entity acting "on behalf of" public agency.

What is a Public Record?

Essentially <u>ANYTHING</u> that relates to the official business of FDSTF:

- Documents?
- Emails?
- Text Messages?
- Facebook Messages?

Yes! If it relates to the official business of FDSTF.

To determine if something is a <u>public record</u> look at the <u>content of record</u> <u>NOT</u> the <u>form of communication</u>!

Are there exemptions?

Yes, some public records are confidential and exempt from the public records laws.

• Example: Social Security #'s, certain home addresses, certain health information, etc.

For something to be exempt, there must be a specific exemption in law.

Exemptions Specific to FDSTF

F.S. 288.985(1)(a) That portion of a record which relates to strengths and weaknesses of military installations or military missions in <u>this state</u> relative to the selection criteria for BRAC

(b) That portion of a record which relates to strengths and weaknesses of military installations or military missions in <u>other states or territories</u> and the vulnerability of such installations or missions to BRAC ... and any agreements or proposals to relocate or realign military units and missions from other states or territories.

(c) That portion of a record which relates to the state's strategy to retain its military bases during any BRAC process and any agreements or proposals to relocate or realign military units and missions.

Who can request?

- Anyone
- Requestor not required to show a "legitimate" or "noncommercial interest"
- Request cannot be denied because "overbroad." Agency may charge for copies and reasonable service charge.
- Requests do not have to be in writing. Requestor does not have to disclose identity or reason for requesting.

How long to keep records?

Retention period depends on the <u>content</u> of the record not the form of the communication.

Do NOT destroy or delete records without knowing the applicable retention period.

FDSTF retention schedule not the same as legislative retention schedule.

Public Records Tips

- Avoid using personal accounts for communication that are not backed up.
- Do not respond to a public records request on your own. Contact FDSTF staff.

Assume that every record you create or receive related to FDSTF is a public record.

Sunshine Law Section 286.011, Florida Statutes.

Provides right of access to governmental proceedings of public boards or commissions at state and local levels.

Equally applicable to both elected and appointed boards.

Applies to virtually every public board in Florida with exception of Legislature and Judiciary.

Applies to Florida Defense Task Force including any subgroup

Three basic requirements:

- Meetings must be **<u>open</u>** to the public.
- **Reasonable notice** of meeting must be given.
- <u>Written minutes</u> of meetings must be taken and recorded.

Applies to <u>any</u> gathering of two or more

members of the same board to discuss

some matter which will *foreseeably* come

before that board for action.

Board members may not engage in private

discussions with each other about board

business, either in person or by telephone,

emailing, texting, or any other type of

communication (Facebook, blogs, etc.)

Does not apply to staff as long as acting in traditional staff role.

Staff cannot be used as a liaison to communicate information from one board member to another.

Exemptions must be in law and

must be specific to Sunshine Law

(public records exemption does

not close a meeting).

Sunshine Exemption FDSTF

Section 288.985(2), Florida Statutes

(a) Meetings or portions of meetings of the FDSTF,
or a workgroup of the TF, ... that are exempt under
subsection (1) are exempt from s. <u>286.011</u> and s.
24(b), Art. I of the State Constitution.

(b) Any records generated during those portions of meetings are exempt from s. <u>119.07</u>(1) and s. 24(a),
Art. I of the State Constitution.

Ethics & Transparency

Members of the Board of Directors, officers, directors and employees of the TF are subject to Florida's Code of Ethics in Chapter, 112, part III.

Board Members serving in other public positions may also be subject to additional ethics requirements and should consult with general counsel of the public entity.

Ethics

Prohibited from soliciting or accepting anything of value to influence official action;

Prohibited from doing business with one's agency;

Prohibited from accepting unauthorized compensation to influence vote or official action;

Ethics

Prohibited from misusing position to secure benefit for self or others;

Prohibited from entering into a conflicting employment or contractual relationship;

Prohibited from disclosing or using info for personal or business gain;

Ethics

Prohibited from serving simultaneously as officer and employee

Subject to nepotism prohibitions.

Voting

Legislative members serving on the Task Force may participate in all Task Force activities but <u>may ONLY vote on matters that</u> are advisory. (Section 288.987(3)(d), Florida Statutes).

Executive Director of DEO, or his or her designee, serves as the ex officio, nonvoting executive director of the Task Force. (Section 288.987(5), Florida Statutes).

Voting Conflicts

<u>May NOT vote</u> on any matter that the Board member knows **would inure to his or her special private gain or loss.**

Must disclose the nature of conflict by filing FORM 8A (*Memorandum of Voting Conflict for State Officers*) with person taking meeting minutes.

Should file Form <u>before</u> vote, or if not possible, no later than 15 days after the vote.

Voting Conflicts

May vote on any matter that the Board member knows would inure to the special private gain or loss of:

- Any principal by whom the Board member is retained;
- Relative; or
- Business Associate.

Must disclose the nature of conflict by filing FORM 8A (*Memorandum of Voting Conflict for State Officers*) with person taking meeting minutes.

Should file Form <u>before</u> vote, or if not possible, no later than 15 days after the vote.

Ethics FDSTF Board Members

Board Members must file Financial Disclosure Form 1 *(Statement of Financial Interests)* if not already required to file Form 6 *(Full Disclosure)*

Filing Financial Disclosure makes Board members "Reporting Individuals" and also subject to:

- Gift ban (s. 112.3148, F.S.);
- Lobbying expenditure ban (s. 112.3215(6)(a), F.S.);
- Prohibition on gifts from political committees (s. 112.31485, F.S.); and
- Honorarium restrictions (s. 112.3149, F.S.).

- Reimbursement must be made according to section 112.061.
- Lodging expenses may not exceed \$150/day, excluding taxes, unless participating in a group rate or at least three rates were acquired.
- Staffing and administrative expenses of TF may not exceed \$250,000, including travel and per diem costs incurred by Task Force members not otherwise eligible for state reimbursement

TASK FORCE shall ensure the following information is posted on its website for public viewing:

a. A list of TF members;

b. TF contact information;

c. A copy of the most recent TF Strategic Plan;

d. TF public meeting notices as required by Florida law;

e. A copy of TF's approved meeting dates for the current year...

(continued)

TASK FORCE shall ensure the following information is posted on its website for public viewing:

f. Copies of TF's meeting agendas and minutes, and copies of any presentations made by TF or any of TF's guest speakers;

g. TF's weekly updates;

h. A copy of the TF's current fiscal year publiclyfunded budget, including revenue amounts and sources, as well as budgeted expenses...

(continued)

TASK FORCE shall ensure the following information is posted on its website for public viewing:

i. TF's most recent Progress Report and Work Plan;

j. A public version of the TF's most recent independent Economic Impact Study;

k. A copy of TF's most recent Public Briefing...

(continued)

TASK FORCE shall ensure the following information is posted on its website for public viewing:

I. All TF's reports prepared in connection with:

1. A list of all TF's grant recipients, organized by year;

2. Copies of each active TF contract for services;

3. Copies of any deliverables or reports due under each active TF contract for services that isn't exempt from public records disclosure pursuant to section 288.985, F.S.

(continued)

2. TASK FORCE's website must:

a. be updated regularly based on the intervals of publication of the information being posted.

b. use appropriate Internet security measures;

c. allow users to navigate to related sites to view supporting details;

d. enable viewers to email questions to TF; and

e. make such questions and TF's responses publicly viewable.

Range Task Force Support

- In February 2021, FDA chartered its Range Task Force (RTF) within the Mission Sustainment Working Group

 - Mapping way-ahead to advance both education, protection, utilization and enhancement opportunities
- Goal is to deliver a comprehensive series of products and marketing engagements to:
 - Educate and inform community and business leaders; agency and defense leadership on the comprehensive Florida range capabilities and currently untapped opportunities for expanded training, testing, development and evaluation activities
 - Develop appropriate proposals (state/federal) to both further protect and enhance Florida's military ranges

 - Tasks and deliverables in direct support of FDSTF primary functions state-wide impact
- ICW UWF, request support for (3) mutually supportive project efforts enhancing RTF work

- Detail messaging channels and methods; strategic and business engagements; and potential scheduling with executive insight to calendars, annual cycles, business fiscal years and investment cycles for acquisitions
- Proposed execution calendar and business operations to achieve desired marketing for investment in, and greater use of, the ranges in current operations and future-facing technologies to support future mission growth, research and emerging operations; JADC2, etc.
- Identify leader engagements; organizations or companies for briefings; events and summits that support the sustainment, growth and investment in Florida's military ranges and research capabilities
 - Have an immediate action component that is executable and an ambitious list of suggested engagements that may be used in future marketing cycles
- Estimated 2-3 months to complete; \$30K



Marketing Support

- Assistance in marketing plan scheduling, accessing, hosting and communicating executive-level marketing engagements with specific leaders, offices, and staffs
 - Meet and brief senior leaders, corporate executives, industry and academic partners on the value, quality and scale of training, test and evaluation ranges and assets available in Florida for expanded Defense Department and other Federal agency use
 - FDSTF can be designated as Executive Agency for oversight
- Hosting and assistance would also detail messaging channels and methods, strategic business engagements, and potential scheduling with executive insight to calendars, annual cycles, business fiscal years and investment cycles for acquisitions
- Each engagement shall also include prep and follow-up support for each event
- Estimated marketing activities will be executed over ~6-month timeframe; \$30K

Proposed Licensure Portability Policy August 19, 2021



Licensure Portability Status

FL passed HB 615 in 2017 an HB29 in 2018:

This bill is a Best Practice for Licensure Portability Policy which exempts a military spouse from most of the application process if they have an active license from another state. Reduces Board's option to interpret scope of active license. Removes licensing fees

Does not provide state to state portability:

Still requires spouses to complete an application process. License is not transferrable to another state. Inconsistent state laws cause confusion



AMENDED AND RESTATED MULTI-YEAR ENCROACHMENT PROTECTION AGREEMENT

INTRODUCTION:

This Amended and Restated Multi-Year Encroachment Protection Agreement Between the United States of America and The Preservation Law Group, Inc., and the City of Jacksonville, Florida ("<u>Agreement</u>") is effective as of the date of the last signature below (the "<u>Effective Date</u>") and is entered into by and among The United States of America, acting by and through The Department of the Navy ("<u>Navy</u>"); The Preservation Law Group, Inc., a Florida corporation ("<u>PLG</u>") whose principal organizational purpose is to assist in the preservation and protection of military installations and civilian airfields by preventing encroaching incompatible land uses; and the City of Jacksonville, Florida, a consolidated political subdivision and municipal corporation existing under the laws of the State of Florida ("<u>City</u>"), (each a "<u>Party</u>" and collectively, the "<u>Parties</u>").

The Parties have entered into this Agreement to establish the terms and conditions applicable to the contribution of Federal funds for acquisition of long-term interests in parcels of land in the vicinity of Naval Air Station Jacksonville ("<u>NAS Jacksonville</u>"), Outlying Landing Field Whitehouse ("<u>OLF Whitehouse</u>"), and Naval Station Mayport ("<u>NS Maypor</u>"). (each an "<u>Installation</u>" and collectively, the "<u>Installations</u>") in accordance with the provisions of 10 U.S.C. §2684a as described in more detail below. This Agreement is amended and restated to add the City of Jacksonville, Florida as a Party and to delete The Preservation Law Group as a Party. The Parties hereby affirm the following Recitals, which Recitals are incorporated into the Agreement by reference.

RECITALS:

A. WHEREAS. Navy and PLG entered into that certain Multi-Year Encroachment Protection Agreement Between the United States of America and The Preservation Law Group. Inc. dated 28 September 2012, (the "<u>Original Agreement</u>") to prevent encroachment, limit incompatible development and promote conservation of ecologically and agriculturally significant lands in the vicinity of the Installations, all as more particularly described in the Original Agreement as amended and restated herein;

B. WHEREAS, Navy and PLG previously amended the Original Agreement pursuant to that certain Amendment No. 1 effective as of 28 September 2012 that obligated an additional \$640,000.00 of Navy funds (the "Previous Amendment") (hereafter, all references to the Original Agreement means the Original Agreement as amended by the Previous Amendment);

C. WHEREAS, pursuant to this Agreement, Navy and PLG desire to amend and restate the Original Agreement by, among other things, adding City as an additional Party so that City may participate in transactions contemplated in the Original Agreement, as amended and restated by this Agreement;



About Camp Blanding Joint Training Center

Camp Blanding Joint Training Center (CBJTC) is a critically vital training center that annually trains over 350,000 Florida National Guard troops, active duty military, law enforcement officers, Department of Homeland Security agents, Drug Enforcement Agents, Florida Department of Law Enforcement agents, various Florida counties' sheriff's department personnel and first responders, and others.

The development pressure from the surrounding area has prompted CBJTC to make the areas along the border of the installation the highest priority for protection from development encroachment.

This project will purchase fee and/or less than fee interest in property(ies) within the approved Army Compatible Use Buffer (ACUB) around CBJTC by using matching funds from the FDSTF and the DoD REPI Program.

The property(ies) will be located within either Bradford County or Clay County.

The buffer will serve as protection from future development-related land-use impacts to the military installation as well as establishing an expanded buffer around CBJTC that will prevents strained relations with nearby residents thus improving the military-friendly environment in Clay County.

The buffer would also facilitate training capability growth within the current boundaries of the installation, as well as protect and safeguard current and future training operations at Camp Blanding.

An additional benefit provided by a permanent buffer area adjacent to the border of the installation is that it protects natural wetlands and state-listed flora and fauna from development activities.

This project will leverage approximately \$500,000 of Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration (DoD-REPI) funds. The specifics of the sale including the appraisals and contract negotiations will be handled by ACUB partner(s).

ACUB partner(s) will utilize the parcel(s) for flood mitigation and water recharge issues in this region. For properties located in Bradford County, there will be an annual payment in lieu of taxes.

The property(ies) are not included in the current Florida Forever Program and would be acquired by ACUB partner(s) as project lands or other protected lands.

Alignment With FDSTF's Strategic Plan

This project directly supports the FDSTF mission, as described in F.S. 288.987, by preserving, protecting, and enhancing Florida's military installations and to improve the states military friendly environment for service members that bring military and base related jobs to the state.

This project aligns with the FDSTF's guiding principles (goals) as identified in the FDSTF Strategic Plan updated on 11/1/10, to identify, prioritize and address all current or potential base and range encroachment issues, including, but not limited to airspace, environmental, energy, frequency spectrum, and land and water use compatibility.

Alignment With FDSTF's Strategic Plan

Finally, the FDSTF Strategic Plan long-term strategic goals for all military installations are addressed by:



- Underwater Sound Reference Division (USRD)
 - Established as War Dept. Lab at Columbia University.
 - Post-war transfer to the Naval Research Laboratory (NRL) and moved to Orlando (Lake Gem Mary).
 - Test facility at Bugg Spring established for low-frequency, low-noise research and development (1956).
 - BRAC moves USRD to the Naval Undersea Warfare Center Division, Newport (NUWCDIVNPT). Bugg Spring continues as NUWCDIVNPT field activity. (1995)
 - Navy acquires Bugg Spring and surrounding property to ensure continuance of mission critical support to research, development and fleet deployers (2011).

A small activity with a long history of critical support to the U.S. Navy



Bugg Spring Mission



- Bugg Spring is the Navy's only facility for the calibration of submarine and surface ship towed sonar arrays and certification of certain special mission sensors and payloads.
- Developmental testing and qualification of submarine, surface ship and airborne antisubmarine warfare (ASW) acoustic systems.
- Special measurements that require low background noise representative of remote ocean locations.



Military Base Protection Program: Non-Conservation Lands

November 18, 2021



Military Base Protection Program

- Established under F.S. 288.980; includes the securing of non-conservation lands to serve as a buffer to protect military installations against encroachment.
- "Non-conservation lands" are defined as lands that are not subject to acquisition by the Florida Forever Program.

Military Base Protection Program

- Task Force must review annually by December 1st the list submitted to DEO by military installations and provide recommendations for ranking the lands back to DEO.
- With each recommended land acquisition:
 - -- Legal description with property ID #
 - -- Detailed map
 - -- Management and monitoring agreement to ensure land serves a base buffering purpose

Process

- Base commanders submit non-conservation land encroachment threats to DEO.
- DEO provides those submissions to Task Force for prioritization.
- FDSTF prioritizes list.
- DEO submits list to the Board of Trustees which may acquire the lands.

Types of Encroachment

- Development in Clear Zone, Accident Potential Zones, or within 65dB and above noise contour line.
- Sites exempted from local government AICUZ Ordinance (previously purchased).
- Proximity to existing sonar testing facility.
- Proximity to existing and proposed ranges.

Considerations

- Existing land use restrictions; actual/current use
- Future land use designation and zoning
- Existing development on site
- Redevelopment potential
- Ownership
- Identified encroachment threat
- Short Term vs. Long Term Threat; development pressures

Prioritization Criteria

- Tier 1
 - High likelihood of incompatible development within Clear Zone or Accident Potential Zone 1.
 - Approved development with potential to impact overall base mission.
 - No existing restrictions on development to reduce encroachment/safety risk.

Prioritization Criteria

• Tier 2

- High likelihood of incompatible development within Accident Potential Zones 1 or 2.
- Proposed development with potential to impact overall base mission.
- Existing development within Clear Zone or Accident Potential Zones, but with low likelihood of redevelopment.

Prioritization Criteria

• Tier 3

- High likelihood of incompatible development within existing noise contours (high noise areas).
- Possible development with potential to impact overall base mission.
- Threat from potential for future development mitigated by one or more of:
 - existing restrictive easements on properties.
 - currently compatible land use
 - currently compatible zoning on property.

- MacDill AFB Florida Rock northern 14.7 acres in CZ
- Naval Air Station Pensacola Cook Property (23+ acres in APZ 1)
- Naval Air Station Key West Alfred Sears Trust Property (124 acres in APZ 1)
- Homestead ARB Homestead Park of Commerce (19.92 acres in APZ 2)
- Avon Park Triple Canopy Ranch (345 acres in MIPA 1)
- Eglin AFB Valparaiso Lots (6 acres/18 homes in Clear Zone)
- Naval Air Station Jacksonville Southbelt Park Ltd. (23 acres in APZ)

Tier 2

- MacDill AFB ZONS Property (5.9 acres in Clear Zone)
- Blount Island Parcel adjacent to main Entry Control Point (4.24 acres)
- NAS Key West Enchanted Island (4 acres in APZ 1)
- MacDill AFB 3C Self Storage in Clear Zone (already developed-incompatible w/ CZ)
- NAS Jacksonville JEMSET LLC (254 acres in APZ 2)
- Bugg Spring Spring Creek Run (49.85 acres in Noise Contour Zone)
- Bugg Spring Joseph Branham (5.5 acres in Noise Contour Zone)

Tier 3

- NAS Key West Gulf Seafood (8 acres in high noise area)
- NS Mayport (1.28 acres adjacent to main gate; security issues)
- MacDill AFB Sally Harris already developed (in APZ 1)
- MacDill AFB Caribbean-American Club already developed (in APZ 1)
- Coast Guard Air Station Miami 1-acre Parking area between Executive Airport & USCG Air Station (security concerns)
- Camp Blanding Ira Adams (85 acres less than one mile from installation boundary and near the artillery impact area, the area that produces the highest noise on the installation)
- Camp Blanding Jason Canova (106 acres adjacent to the installation boundary and adjacent to the Corridor and Route System (CARS) aviation route in and around installation)

MBPP Funding

- Original state funding for 3 parcels (FL Rock, Mayport Village and Barefoot Palms) was \$7.5 million in FY14-15
- \$3.7 million remained with DEP for FL Rock property; all funding reverted in FY19-20.
- No additional funding appropriated to date.


