
# Florida-Mexico Bilateral Trade (2022)


Over the past few decades, North American neighbors Mexico and the United States have seen a boom in bilateral cross-border trade and investment. With the two nations' economies becoming ever-more-closely integrated, some of this trade is conducted among affiliates of the same company on different sides of the international border. And the newly-implemented <a href="USMCA">USMCA</a> partnership promises to advance these close ties even further. As the third-largest U.S. state and a major hub for global commerce, Florida has provided a significant contribution to this trading relationship.



Most Florida-Mexico trade is conducted by truck or rail across international borders, as is the case with Canada. To get a better understanding of Florida-Mexico trade, we present trade data based on the origin and destination of the goods, rather than how they are transported, which is the traditional way of reporting on trade data.

- Mexican imports from Florida <sup>1</sup> totaled \$4.0 billion in 2022, making Mexico the state's 3<sup>rd</sup> largest export market.
- Mexican exports to Florida<sup>2</sup> totaled **\$9.6** *billion* in 2022, making Mexico Florida's 2<sup>nd</sup> largest source market of imports.

# Mexican Investment in Florida (FDI in 2020)

- Based on the most recent statistics from the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, Mexico is the 13<sup>th</sup> largest foreign direct investor in Florida, with Mexican-owned affiliates accounting for more than 5,400 Florida jobs.
- Mexican affiliates in Florida were estimated to have total holdings of USD \$1.4 billion in gross property, plant, and equipment in 2020.
- According to SelectFlorida's database of foreign-owned affiliates in Florida, there are more than 40 Mexican companies operating over 100 branch locations in Florida.

# Mexican Tourism & Diaspora in Florida

- In 2022, 443,000 Mexicans visited Florida, accounting for 4.5% of total international visitors to Florida. This 14% growth over 2022 signals a strong recovery of Mexican tourism.
- Mexico ranked 3<sup>rd</sup> largest nationality of Latin American visitors to Florida in 2022, following Brazil and Colombia, but preceding Argentina and Chile, and 5th largest nationality of all international visitors



- Over 285,000 Mexican-born residents live in Florida as of 2021, according to the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey.
- About 5.5 million Hispanic Americans live in Florida as of 2020, comprising roughly 25% of the state's population and a majority population of Miami.
- An estimated 4.6 million Floridians speak Spanish at home as of 2021, over 20% of the state's population. This is a substantial comparative advantage when it comes to doing business.
